#### Index of Independence in ADLs

- In use at Queensway Carleton Hospital on the Acute Care of the Elderly Unit
- \* Modified from Katz Index of ADL (Katz el al, 1963)
- Found through the 'Try This' library from the NICHE network of hospitals

#### Index of Independence in ADLs

- Help staff understand patient's baseline level of independence (approx. 2 weeks prior to admission)
- Compare to level of independence at time of admission
- Recognize when patient has returned to baseline level
- Recognize when patient has plateaued and may need to considered for a transitional program

#### Meet Alice...

COPD on 2L Home O2 History of Smoking HTN Seasonal Allergies 80 lbs



#### Let's get a Baseline ADL Score...

- \* Alice uses a 4 wheel walker to get around the house
- \* Uses bathroom and bedside commode independently
- Manages own incontinence pads
- Family assists with most of showers and dressing due to SOBOE
- Family prepare meals but Alice feeds herself



#### Meet Alice...

Fall/Hip Fracture (3 weeks rehab)

SBO requiring ICU admission for BiPAP



#### Meet Alice...

Presented to ED with decreased LOC and confusion

Admitted to the ACE Unit with hyponatremia



#### Day 1...

## Alice is hooked up to an IV and is drowsy



### Day 2...

Alice is more alert and confusion is clearing.

IV infusion stopped



## Day 3...

Alice is alert and her confusion has cleared.


She finds it difficult to get out of the hospital beds without help.



#### Going home with confidence...

Alice is not at baseline but the team recognizes limitations related to her being outside of her usual environment.

Team uses these observations to discuss discharge with family and family agrees to take Alice home.



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
